

IS 1932: 1986- Mustard and Rape Seed Oilcake As Livestock Feed Ingredient

Mustard accounted for 26% of total **Oilseeds** produced in India, and the production is expected to rise. **Mustard cake**, about 60% of the seed, is generated as byproduct during **extraction of the oil**. Mustard and Rapeseed Oilcake is a widely used livestock feed that provides essential nutrients to animals. India holds third position in world for production of mustard cake. The cake/meal, i.e. the residue/byproduct obtained after extraction of oil is used as a **feed** for cattle, poultry and aquatic animal (1). Mustard cake has a good balance of **essential amino acids** and relatively high **methionine** content (2).

The Indian Standard IS 1932:1986, revised on January 31, 1986, defines its quality requirements and testing methods, ensuring it meets safety and nutritional needs. This standard categorizes the oilcake into two types based on pressing methods: hydraulic or expeller pressed and ghani or kolhu pressed. Each type is available in two quality grades: High Fat (HF) and Low Fat (LF), catering to diverse dietary needs.

To meet consumer expectations for quality, the standard mandates that oilcake must be free from harmful constituents, rancidity, adulterants, and extraneous matter. Specific limits are set to control moisture content, protein, fat, fibre, and ash levels. For HF grade oilcake must contain a minimum of 35% crude protein and 8% crude fat. For LF grade, the minimum requirements are 33% protein and 5% fat. Moisture is capped at 10%, crude fiber at 9% for HF and 10% for LF, with a maximum of 8% total ash for HF and 9% for LF. Acid-insoluble ash content is also strictly limited to ensure product purity, with a maximum of 1.5% for HF and 2.0% for LF.

Packaging is a critical aspect of the standard, with requirements for clean jute or HDPE bags labeled with details such as product name, type, grade, manufacturer, batch number, net weight, and packing date. The standard includes sampling and testing guidelines to uphold quality control and compliance, giving consumers confidence in the product's reliability and nutritional value.
